I remember fondly all of the cars the Hildebrand family drove before I got "my" first car. I recall my father bought a forest green 1948 Chevrolet truck that we used to take deer hunting. The problem was that when we parked it and went hunting, we often "lost" the green truck in the forest (probably the best thing to do with a Chevrolet). He then got wise and bought a 1951 red Ford pickup with a flathead V8 and a granny four speed. We didn't lose it so much and it would go up the mountain trails better with the V8. Then he updated to a 1953 model truck with flathead a

4-speed. It was white and much easier to find in the woods. The '53 eventually went to my older brother who fixed it up and put big "mountain climbing" tires on the back. We had many adventures going up mountains and through the desert. We then got a nice baby blue 1956 Ford truck (I wish I had that one back), then a '58 Ford truck and a 1958 Ranchero that became a daily driver for me until I got my own car. I remember standing in the front yard with my younger brother watching up the road when my Dad drove home a 1958 Fairlane hardtop. It was smoking slightly and ran REALLY bad. My little brother joked about it being "MY" car. I didn't hit him that time.

When we got a chance to tear into it we found that the spark plugs had probably never been changed by the previous owner. With a quick tune up, the Y-block came to life and I went roaring off in the first car that was really "mine."

I drove the Fairlane for a good while and had many fond memories of the car. Then one day, my little brother brought home a 1955 Ford Crown Victoria with the sun roof but without a motor. He was not yet old enough to drive legally but went right to fixing up the car and detailing it. We found a nice '54 Merc Y-block engine and trans to put in it. I liked the '55 so much that I traded him the '58 for the Crown Vic and drove that car until I was almost 19 years old. Boy, I really wish I had that one back! I got stupid and

traded it in for a 1963 Galaxy with a 406/4-speed because it was much faster. Although I drove the flathead and Y-block cars and trucks, none of them were really "mine" until the Fairlane. It was truly my "first" car, but my favorite was the Crown Victoria which was actually my second car!

On July 16 John lit up the tires on his Model A Coupe at the Barona Antique drags - averaging 108 in 6 sec and change on the 1/8 mile strip. He took 'The Gambler' race & made it to the second round. In the

background, the Rockabilly Tour featuring mostly Rat Rods, gathered around a loud DJ and vender tents. Many guys bearing an uncanny resemblance to Elvis, '55, stopped to rubber neck one naked mannequin with peak-a-boo tattoos. -TS





These amounts are all 'guesstamates'. This is a cool summer, no fail appetizer or main course, so enjoy and have fun experimenting --- Eat Hearty





You can't make this Stuff up. "This 1950 Business Coupe was taken off the

road in 1960 with only 26,000 miles on it. It was converted to a A/Gas car called 'The Blunder'. It ran a 430 Lincoln, four speed and a GMC truck rear with 488 gears. It hit the drag strips in '62 and was raced around the midwest. In '71 my brother bought the car. He was 19 and I was 14. We raced at Minnesota Dragway

in the early '70s until we blew the Lincoln. We swapped the blown motor with a 389 Tri Power Pontiac and raced occasionally but mostly street drove it until '74. In '75 we sold the motor to one guy, the top loader trans to another and the body to a third guy. In 1990 we bought the body back in the same condition as we had sold it in '75. 'The Blunder' was sold in the estate sale to a hot rodder, but then he found another '50 that was a better candidate for his street rod. So I bought it back in 2010- still in the same condition from 1975 - except the rear had been changed to a nine inch. I was the last to drive 'The Blunder' back in '74. But now it's home again, where my dream WILL

Fire Truck

I have this '56 Ford pickup I call my 'Fire Truck'. In 1999 my friend and I were headed to Hot August Nights. He was driving a nice 1929 Model A Ford pickup.

I was heading up 163 near Mira Mesa, it was about 4:30 AM so pretty dark. The truck

just lost power and I headed for the side of the road. Because my nose does not work I could not smell anything. I opened the hood and there was a <u>huge ball of fire</u>- it lit up everything. I had a fire extinguisher in the bed of the truck and quickly shot it into the engine compartment. (you can see some of the white powder on the fender) Amazing how fast that works. I had it towed back to San Diego and took out my 'stuff' and put it in my other '56 Ford pickup (it is blue). My friend and I headed out again, just two hours behind time. (He and I almost always drive two, just in case). The fire blistered the paint on the hood, melted the carburetor and fried the wiring, other than that it was fine.
